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

Laparoscopic Recto sigmoid Resection and Anastomosis in Bowel Endometriosis: Single Stapler Technique

Background and Objectives: Endometriosis affects 10% of reproductive-age women globally, with bowel endometriosis in 3.8%-37% of cases, primarily involving the rectum and sigmoid. Surgical excision is the gold-standard treatment for deeply infiltrating endometriosis (DIE). Our objective was to evaluate the feasibility, safety, and efficacy of a single-stapler laparoscopic rectosigmoid resection technique for bowel DIE.

Methods: This retrospective study analyzed 17 cases managed from January 2023 - June 2024. Clinical presentation, surgical outcomes, and follow-up data were reviewed. Symptom improvement and complications were assessed during a minimum 3-month postoperative period.

Results: Patients reported progressive dysmenorrhea, dyspareunia, and dyschezia. All anastomoses were tension-free with negative margins; no diversion stomas were needed. Postoperative recovery was smooth, with significant symptom relief and no complications.


Conclusion: The single-stapler technique for laparoscopic recto sigmoid resection is a safe, effective approach for bowel DIE, offering excellent outcomes with no morbidity and significant symptom improvement.

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

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

MEDICO-LEGAL ASPECTS OF POISONING

CURRENT PERSPECTIVES AND CHALLENGES" SEMINAR WAS ORGANIZED AT NATIONAL FORENSIC SCIENCES UNIVERSITY (NFSU) IN ASSOCIATION WITH INDIAN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION-GUJARAT STATE BRANCH (IMA-GSB)



A seminar on "Medico-Legal Aspects of Poisoning: Current Perspectives and Challenges," was jointly organized by the Centre for Emergency Toxicology (CET), School of Medico-Legal Studies, NFSU, and the Indian Medical Association – Gujarat State Branch on 27th April 2025. Medical practitioners of various parts of the Gujarat attended the seminar and discussed the challenges and technicalities. Officials of NFSU discussed the role of CET which is established at the National Forensic Sciences



University (NFSU)to ensure health and safety by providing accurate diagnosis and how CET can help different hospitals and medical professionals in timely diagnosis of poisoning.

SEMINAR HIGHLIGHTS AND SESSIONS

Medicolegal Cases: Principles, Practices, And Implications

Prof. Dr. G. Rajesh Babu- Dean, School of Medico-Legal Studies, NFSU

Presented a comprehensive overview of the legal frameworks surrounding poisoning cases, focussed on the roles and responsibilities of medical professionals, mechanism and progress in evidence collection, documentation protocols, and the interface between medical and legal systems. He emphasized the importance of understanding the legal implications of clinical actions taken during emergency care.

Standard Protocols For Poison Sample Collection, Preservation, And Chain Of Custody

Dr. Neelkant Verma - Assistant Professor (Toxicology), NFSU

Highlighted the critical importance of standardized procedures in handling samples. He explained the toxicity incidents, specimen location and collection, national and international guidelines and chain of custody. He addressed best practices in collecting, labelling, preserving, and transferring toxicological specimens while maintaining the chain of custody to ensure their admissibility in court.

Medico-Legal Cases: Documentation, Consent, and Confidentiality Dr. Dhwani Patel - Assistant Professor (Forensic Odontology), NFSU

In this session, focused on the legal and ethical aspects of documentation in medico legal cases, particularly emphasizing informed consent, patient confidentiality, and the importance of maintaining accurate medico-legal records. She elaborated upon registration of medicolegal case in a hospital, documentation, guidelines for medicolegal case report, dying declaration, leaving against medical advice and discharge against medical advice.



Poison Detection: Techniques for Clinical and Forensic Toxicology Dr. Bhoomika Patel - Head, Centre for Emergency Toxicology, Dean, School of Pharmacy,NFSU

This session was covered by focusing the latest technological advancements in the detection of poisons in biological samples, highlighting thevarious instrumental methods. These techniques includes colorimetric methods, spectrometric methods, chromatographic methods, and hyphenated techniques. Furthermore, the session outlined the qualitative and quantitative test panels provided by CET and tests such as RBC cholinesterase assay, immunoassay, ICPMS, blood oximetry. She also mentioned the cases that were diagnosed by CET and the appropriate treatment followed by the patient based on the results.

The Pivotal Role of Legally Prepared Emergency Departments in Modern Justice

Dr. Yogesh Gupta – Head of Geriatrics, Sterling Hospital&Professor of practice, NFSU

This interactive sessionshared the real-world challenges faced by emergency departments when dealing with suspected poisoning cases. He emphasized the importance of legal preparedness, staff training, documentation standards, and timely communication with law enforcement authorities to support both patient care and judicial processes. He also explained the key medicolegal challenges and its actionable solutions in poisoning cases.

ENDNOTE

The seminar served a valuable insightinto the complexities between the medical practice and legal frameworks in poisoning cases, addressing systemic challenges, and proposing actionable solutions. Each sessions provided an in-depth overview of the key aspects involved in the effective management of poisoning cases, ranging from initial clinical assessment and toxicological diagnosis to medico-legal documentation. The knowledge shared during this event serves as a valuable resource for medical and legal professionals to improve practices and ensure justice and safety in handling such cases.

NEWER UPDATES IN TUBERCULOSIS

Tuberculosis (TB) is a major infectious disease causing significant morbidity and mortality worldwide. India remains the highest contributor to the global TB burden, necessitating continuous advancements in diagnosis, treatment, and prevention strategies.

Epidemiology

India reported 2.77 million TB cases in 2022, with an incidence rate of 199 per 100,000 population. Drug-resistant TB (DR-TB) accounts for 2.5% of new cases and 13% of previously treated cases. HIV-TB coinfection affects 2% of TB patients, and major risk factors include undernutrition, diabetes, smoking, and immunosuppression. Strengthened private sector engagement and digital surveillance have improved case notification rates.

Updated Case Definitions

TB classification emphasizes microbiological confirmation, treatment history, and drug resistance patterns. Cases are categorized as bacteriologically confirmed or clinically diagnosed. DR-TB is classified into multidrug-resistant (MDR-TB), pre-extensively drug-resistant (Pre-XDR-TB), and extensively drug- resistant (XDR-TB), guiding appropriate treatment strategies.

Advancements in Diagnosis

Rapid detection technologies such as CBNAAT, Truenat, and Line Probe Assay (LPA) enhance TB control efforts. The Cy-TB test, a novel blood-based assay, significantly improves the detection of latent TB, contributing to expanded preventive therapy. Universal Drug Sensitivity Testing (UDST) is now emphasized to ensure individualized treatment strategies.



Evolving Treatment Strategies

The BPaL-M regimen (Bedaquiline, Pretomanid, Linezolid, Moxifloxacin) offers a six-month, all-oral therapy for DR-TB, improving cure rates. Drug-sensitive TB (DS-TB) continues to be treated with a standard six-month, four-drug regimen. Digital adherence tools like 99DOTS, video-supported therapy (VST), and Al-driven monitoring improve treatment success.

Tuberculosis Preventive Therapy (TPT)

TPT focuses on high-risk populations, including household contacts and people living with HIV (PLHIV). Preventive regimens include Isoniazid (INH) for 6-9 months and Rifampicin for 4 months, with digital adherence tracking to improve compliance.

Strengthened Prevention and Support Initiatives

The Nikshay Poshan Yojana (NPY) provides 500 per month to TB patients for nutritional support. Private facilities receive Rs. 500 for notifying each TB patient and another Rs. 500 for declaring the treatment outcome. The Nikshay Mitra Initiative encourages NGOs, corporations, and individuals to adopt TB patients, offering nutritional and psychosocial support to enhance adherence.

Conclusion

India's TB control strategy integrates advanced diagnostics, innovative treatments, preventive therapy, financial support, and community-driven programs. Early detection, preventive measures, and digital health interventions are critical for achieving a TB-free India by 2025.







Violence Against Doctors

There is a sharp escalation of cases of violence against doctors in the recent past. Violence against healthcare professionals has occurred in the form of physical violence, verbal abuse, aggressive gestures, blackmail, and cyber-bullying. Violence against doctors has been observed in the United States, Australia, India, China, Pakistan, Nepal, Sri Lanka and others.

Australia: In 2019, a survey showed that in the last three years, there has been a 48 percent increase in assaults against nurses in Queensland. and in other cities too.

India: The Indian Medical Association has reported that 75% of doctors face verbal or physical abuse in hospital premises and fear of violence was the most common cause for stress for 43% doctors.

In May 2023, a junior doctor was stabbed to death while on night duty, by a patient brought to casualty for medical examination by the Police in a Government hospital in the Indian state of Kerala. The incident sparked widespread outrage and protests by doctors resulting in the Kerala Government passing an ordinance to provide stricter punishment for violence against hospitals and healthcare workers.

On 9 August 2024, a second-year postgraduate trainee (PGT) doctor at RG Kar Medical College in Kolkata, West Bengal, India was found dead in a seminar hall on the college campus. The incident has sparked significant outrage and nationwide protests which demand a thorough investigation while also questioning the safety of women in India.

In China, a 2019 survey by Dingxiang Yuan, a website for healthcare professionals, showed that 85% of doctors had experienced violence in their workplace.

United States: A 2018 survey conducted by the American College of Emergency Physicians showed that out of more than 3,500 E.R. doctors, 47% of the doctors had been assaulted. 97% of the time, the assailant was a patient.

Prevalence and Types of Violence:

Verbal Abuse Predominant: While physical violence does occur, verbal abuse and threats are the most common forms of violence reported by doctors.

Emergency Services and ICUs: Emergency services and intensive care units (ICUs) are identified as high-risk areas for violence against doctors.

Reasons for Violence: Common triggers for violence include patient death, perceived delays in treatment, lack of medicines, and inadequate attention to the patient.



Examples of Violence: Reported incidents include verbal threats, physical assaults, and even instances of doctors being manhandled or threatened by patient relatives.

Factors Contributing to Violence:

Systemic Issues: Poor healthcare infrastructure, lack of resources, and long working. communication between doctors and patients/their families can lead to misunderstandings and escalations.

Lack of Grievance Redressal

Media Representation: Negative portrayals of doctors in the media can fuel public resentment and contribute to a climate of distrust.

High Expectations: High public expectations and lack of understanding of the complexities of medical care can also contribute to violence.

LEGAL & PREVENTIVE MEASURES

Legislation: Some states in India have enacted legislation to prevent violence against healthcare workers, but enforcement and awareness remain challenges.

- Hospital Security: Hospitals are urged to implement security measures, including protection teams, posters warning against violence, and restricting visitor access.
- Training: Training for healthcare staff on de-escalation techniques and conflict resolution is crucial.

Strengthening Doctor-Patient Relationships:

IMA has been demanding a strong Central Law for protection of the healthcare professionals. This is because although several states have some form of a law for this purpose it has failed to prevent acts of violence. The recent RG Kar incident has shaken the entire country and we must ensure that such a tragic occurrence should never be repeated again.

Historically, the erstwhile state of Andhra Pradesh was first to bring in a law for this purpose. The Andhra Pradesh Medicare Service Persons and Medicare Service Institutions (Prevention of Violence and Damage to Property) Act, 2008, was established to safeguard Medicare service personnel and protect property within healthcare institutions. Subsequently, several states have passed a law for this purpose. However the punishment varies from state to state and in most of the states the offence is non-cognisable and bailable.

In 2019 a bill was tabled in parliament for making the Central Act for protection of healthcare workers. However, there was no further progress on this issue. The argument that health is a state subject and so we cannot have a central law is



incorrect. We had witnessed that during the covid-19 pandemic the central government took to the Epidemic Diseases Act 1987 and enforced it during the Covid-19 pandemic by way of Epidemic Diseases (Amendment) Ordinance 2020. In similar lines we need to work towards a central act which will serve as a strong deterrent. The States should strengthen their own Acts and make it 7 year punishment and a non-bailable offence. Also, as has been done in Karnataka, the onus should be on the accused to prove himself/herself innocent and not on the complainant to prove the accused guilty. In Kerala too, following the gruesome murder of Dr. Vanada Das, a young medico on duty, the "Kerala Healthcare Service Persons and Healthcare Service Institutions (Prevention of Violence and Damage to Property) Amendment Act of 2023" was introduced which is one of the strongest State laws in India for protecting health professionals. This act extends protection to a wide range of healthcare workers, including doctors, nurses, paramedics, pharmacists, lab technicians, clerks, ministerial staff, and security guards. The High Court of Kerala has directed that an FIR be filed within one hour after the incidence of violence. The Kerala Act also makes violence against healthcare workers VAHCW a cognisable and non-bailable offence. It also allows for expedited delivery of justice by stipulating that an Inspector must complete an investigation into the offence within sixty days of filing an FIR. Once produced in court, the victims must be examined on consecutive days. This ensures that the court trial process is short and not drawn out. The Kerala Act has also given provisions for special sessions courts with a special prosecutor to try cases under this Act to ensure speedy justice delivery.

Cognizable offence is a serious crime that a police officer can investigate and arrest without a warrant. The police can also file a first information report (FIR) for cognizable offenses.

- Examples of cognizable offenses murder, rape, kidnapping, theft, and dowry death. Cognizable offenses are usually serious and carry a sentence of 3 years or more
- Cognizable offenses are mostly non-bailable
- Cognizable offenses do not have provisions for compromise between the parties involved.

State Laws: nearly 24 states have their own laws to protect medical professionals, Why a Central Act?

- Uniformity: A central law would ensure consistent application of the law across different states.
- Stronger Deterrent: Stricter penalties for violence against healthcare workers can deter potential aggressors.

What are provisions brought in by centre?

On August 16, the Ministry of healthy and Family Welfare issued an order that " in the event of any violence against any health care worker while on duty, the head of the institution shall be responsible for filing an institutional FIR within a maximum of six hours of the incident,"

The National Task Force (NTF), formed by the Supreme Court in connection with the suo motu matter of RG Kar rape and murder case, has suggested in its report a 'separate central law' is not needed to protect healthcare professionals.

The NTF report filed in the apex court cited that existing state laws and the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita, 2023 (BNS), can address violence against doctors and other medical professionals. The report dealt with the question of whether existing law enforcement mechanisms needed to be strengthened to address violence against healthcare professionals. The NTF report highlighted that 24 states have already enacted laws addressing violence against regard. Most of the state laws cover minor offences and prescribe punishment for them. The major offences/heinous offences are adequately covered under BNS,"

The Indian Medical Association (IMA) earlier wrote to the NTF demanding a deterrent central law to safeguard doctors and healthcare staff, as well as designating the hospitals as safe zones. The task force also suggested filing FIRs, including zero FIRS, within six hours of reporting any violence against medical professionals at their workplaces, it also identified poor communication between medical professionals and families of the patients as a significant contributor to frustration, mistrust and tension that lead violence and mob attacks.

THE STATES SHOULD STRENGTHEN THEIR OWN ACTS AND MAKE IT 7 YEARS PUNISHMENT AND A NON-BAILABLE OFFENCE AND NATIONAL IMA SHOULD CONTINUE TO FIGHT FOR CENTRAL ACT AGAINST VIOLENCE. LONG LIVE IMA.

HOW I DO DVT - Evaluation for Underlying Cause - PART 11

Question: In last part, we covered some important points related to VTE (Deep Vein Thrombosis and Embolism) 1. More people are dying today from VTE than from Bleeding. 2. Modern lifestyle, obesity, age, cancer, hospitalization, several surgeries, pregnancy are some of the most important risk factors for thrombosis. 3. So many new medicines have come in last two decades i.e. anticoagulants. 4. Symptoms of DVT and how to diagnose using tests. Symptoms and signs are frequently not classical. No blood test can diagnose DVT. 5. Urgency of diagnosis and treatment. Precautions before starting anticoagulation.

Now that we have discussed diagnosis, and work up before starting anticoagulation, can we discuss details of anticoagulation?

Answer: NOT YET. It is important to remember that yes it is urgent to start anticoagulation. But our thought process does not need to end there. In parallel, we have to initiate work up for

<u>underlying cause</u> for DVT/VTE. Most commonly, doctors start anticoagulation and then forget to ask the question WHY?

Cause of DVT is either hereditary disorders or acquired. Acquired are far more common. It is important not to miss the most common causes that we discussed i.e. underlying cancer, recent surgery, recent hospitalization, recent immbolization. Obesity is an important risk factor, but we do look for other reasons. Effects of modern lifestyle, obesity, age cannot be detected by a test. Also, see CBC carefully. If there are any signs of myeloproliferative neoplasm e.g. platelets, WBC, or Hb even if mildly on higher side. These changes can be subtle, not always typical very high wbc or very high platelet. They can be just outside of normal range. Or even within normal range, and one may still have minor changes in differential count, or a mild splenomegaly. Molecular tests from blood can then get us to an early diagnosis of MPN.

In addition, age appropriate (means standard recommendations for given age, not for every patient e.g. PSA only if male above age 50, or mammogram only if age above 40)cancer screening is very important. Including at least a USG of abdomen, chest x ray (CT scan if any doubt by history or examination); PSA, stool occult blood for 3 days or colonoscopy, mammogram, PAP smear, low threshold for CT chest if smoker. Even a small asymptomatic cancer can lead to DVT. It does not have to be advanced disease.

Large majority of patients however, do not have a clear underlying reason we can diagnose. Even after extensive blood tests or other tests. When I order detailed thrombophilia panel, I do advise patients that in about 80% cases, we will not find any reason. In western literature, this number is about 50%, largely due to a high number of Factor V Leiden mutation in white population.

Most of the work up can happen in parallel or even weeks later, but what we do need to draw before starting anticoagulation is: **lupus anticoagulant**. Since this test can be false positive in presence of heparin, LMWH, most oral anticoagulants today. A negative test however is ok even on anticoagulation.

Minimum work up that we order in most patients is: Homocysteine; APLA i.e. lupus anticoagulant, anticardiolipin antibody IgG and IgM, antibeta2 glycoprotein antibody IgG and IgM; blood smear review; USG abdomen, chest x ray; age appropriate cancer screening.

In western literature, homocysteine is considered a very weak risk factor for DVT and guidelines now do not recommend routine testing for this. However, what we and other colleagues have found that in India, homocysteine values are frequently much higher than western datasets. Their high is about 15 or so, whereas here we frequently find over 50 or 75. Likely due to much more common deficiency of vitamin B, but could have additional reasons. Homocysteine is an easy blood test, and if high we can look for deficiency of vitamin B and treat it easily. B1,B6,B12 combination, or simple b complex, or even only B12& folic acid supplements are used.

Many people routinely order extensive thrombophilia testing, even with first episode of DVTi.e. panels including hereditary factors. Costing about 30-40,000. Remember this is not part of minimum work up we do, as noted above. And why is that? First it is not recommended by guidelines for every patient. Second because it does not change management most of the time. Once which change management are included in minimum work up noted above. Hereditary factors rarely lead to DVT by themselves. Also, most of them are very rare anyways. Hence chance of finding them is very low, and unless patient is very young, or has a strong family history, they should not be routinely tested with first episode of DVT. With second episode, one may consider. There also, it is not mandatory, since in most cases, anticoagulation details are decided by Clinical details of DVT (site, severity, frequency etc), rather than underlying hereditary factors. So for example, if one finds a factor V Leiden mutation with first DVT, duration of anticoagulation does not increase. And if one finds same mutation or absence of it, with second DVT, duration of anticoagulation does not reduce. Same for most other hereditary factors. With second DVT, long term anticoagulation is recommended for most DVT regardless of any such tests. And with first DVT, it is mostly about 6 months, regardless of such tests.

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


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


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Hodgkin Lymphoma in Children, Adolescents and Young Adults

- Lymphoma is a type of blood cancer that develops when white blood cells called lymphocytes grow out of control. Lymphocytes are part of your immune system.
- Childhood Hodgkin lymphoma has two main types classic and nodular sclerosing.

Symptoms


- lymph node swelling
- feeling sick or being sick
- · coughing or difficulty breathing
- · itchiness in skin
- anorexia
- feeling very tired

It's common for children with Hodgkin lymphoma to experience fevers, night sweats and weight loss-known as 'B symptoms'.

Diagnosis and staging

Hodgkin lymphoma is diagnosed with a small operation called a <u>Biopsy</u>. A sample of tissue, such as a swollen lymph node, is removed. Other tests to access general health and to find out which parts of your body are affected by lymphoma. This is called <u>'staging'</u>.

- A CT scan, often combined with a PET scan
- A bone marrow biopsy.
- Blood Tests like CBC, ESR, CRP, Albumin Risk Factors
- · EBV infection, HIV infection
- Immune disorders like autoimmune lymphoproliferative syndrome
- On Chemotherapy or immunosuppressive therapy

Treatment

Most Children with Hodgkin lymphoma are treated with chemotherapy. Radiotherapy, targeted therapy and immunotherapy are also used based on staging, response and if the disease is relapsing or refractory in nature. Surgery is rarely needed in certain subtypes of Hodgkins.

Chemo regimes - ABVD/OEPA/ABVE-PC

For cases of High risk, refractory or released Hodgkin newer agents are now used

- Targeted therapy (Brentuximab)
- Immunotherapy (Nivolumab)
- Radiotherapy
- High dose chemotherapy with Autologous Stem cell Transplant
- CAR T-Cell Therapy

Prognosis

- Survival rates for this cancer are about 90% with complete cure seen in those treated early and under close supervision.
- Hodgkin Lymphoma in Children should be treated under the <u>care of an Experienced Pediatric Oncologist Hematologist in a hospital experienced to take care of children with cancer.</u>





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
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
